- Street Smart campaign has been added to committee tasks
 - Trish and Laura are on the committee but it hasn't met yet
 - Will and Keith were not present at this breakout meeting
 - Street Smart is an ongoing program with dedicated funding-need to determine how to best integrate the program with this subcommittee
 - Action item from Bike-Ped EA is to expand Street Smart across NJ
 - SS looking to be more data-driven, equity-focused
 - Street Smart integration with this subcommittee should be clarified at next action team meeting
 - Should be under education, but we don't have an education subcommittee
- Previous meetings about automated speed enforcement and vulnerable road user task
 - Prior research has been done by VTC and will be reviewed to see if anything can be added
 - Greater focus will be on interviews with states and organizations that have implemented VRU and ASE laws
 - Google folder exists for sharing resources and accessing past work
 - List of potential interviewees
 - List of questions to ask
 - Committee members should add resources and articles related to ASE and VRU, and should add to the interviewee and questions lists
- Overview of upcoming tasks
 - Literature review of VRU and ASE laws
 - o Inventory of implementation around the country
 - o Interviews with implementers in other states
 - List of existing work in NJ
 - \circ $\;$ List of barriers to implementation
 - List of equity considerations
 - Memos with best practices and examples for NJ to consider–by December 2021
- Potential for this subcommittee to create model legislation for NJ (outside of purview of SHSP)
 - BPAC cannot itself lobby for anything



- Safe Passing Bill, VRU is a component of that-it would be good to bring Jim Hunt into the conversation about the Safe Passing Bill
 - Safe Passage Bill closer to getting into committee than it has been in the past
 - This work, best practices, lit review could be used by advocates in their legislative proposal
- Doesn't need to have specific language of bill, but could include how similar bills in other states actually passed—add to interview questions
- Part of the research will address barriers to implementation—what worked and what didn't
- Research should look at where states use funding for ASE–safety projects? Is it competitively awarded from a single fund?
- Implementation is important–what to do with this research/memo after December
 - Doesn't need to be specific legislation
 - How best practices could best be utilized at different levels in different agencies
 - \circ $\;$ How does this info get incorporated as policy and not just legislation
- Need to bridge the gap between complete streets design guidance and safe passing legislation/on-street behavior of drivers and cyclists
- Research into why ASE is banned in NJ
 - Could be addressed through interviews
 - Political history—banned because politicians said it didn't work or was a money grab by police depts, despite objections from some cities that it was working
 - That is why it is important to bring evidence from other states that it does work
 - Look at how these states allocate revenues to address accusations that ASE is a money grab
 - Focus on ASE in school and work zones, but don't limit scope to just those areas
 - The effectiveness of ASE can be easily studied and quantified, which helps in making the case for this type of intervention
- Research should include a focus on equity in both VRU and ASE
 - How are these laws enforced? Who is being pulled over for violating VRU?
- Recommended NJ legislation from 2016-2017 to protect bicyclists and pedestrians
 - Add any topics to list of research?
 - Might be a good idea to check in on these to see what's been introduced—often difficult to know what becomes of bills (introduced, defeated, lingering, etc.)
 - Sonia can pull list of NJ bills to check
 - Debra and Laura can put together list of federal bills
- Background information on how other states use safety advisory councils
 - BPAC has done this research previously in 2020
 - Susan will try to share what has been done—there may be opportunities to add



- Overlap in task leaders—work plans should identify areas where coordination can happen
 - Sequencing challenges with EA action teams
 - o Two of six BPAC meetings each year should focus specifically on SHSP
 - o Look at all work plans together and identify areas of overlap
- Future subcommittee meetings
 - Meet between each BPAC meeting, 30-minute check-ins
 - Next meeting for week of March 22
- Action items:
 - \circ Sonia will pull list of prior NJ bills related to bicycle and pedestrian safety to check what's been introduced
 - Debra and Laura will put together list of federal bills
 - Susan will try to share prior research into other state BPACs
 - Reach out to Will and Keith to determine how best to integrate Street Smart program into subcommittee work
 - Committee members should add to lists of potential interviewees and interview questions
 - Sonia will follow up with an email scheduling the next meeting
