County Aid

- All counties eligible
- Non–competitive
- Allocations based on county population and road mileage
- \$78.75 M TTF
- Transportation projects including improvements to county owned roads and bridges

Municipal Aid

- All municipalities eligible
- Competitive application process
- \$78.75 M TTF
- Road rehabilitation and reconstruction, pedestrian safety, bikeways, and streetscapes
- 2014 program funded projects in 377 towns



Newark





Bikeways Program

- Municipalities and counties eligible
- Competitive application process
- \$IM TTF
- Promotes bicycling as an alternate mode of transportation
- Primary objective: 1,000 new miles of dedicated bike paths



Middle Township



Safe Streets to Transit Program

- Municipalities and counties eligible
- Competitive application process
- \$I M –TTF in 2014
- Improves pedestrian access to transit facilities and all modes of public transportation








Other NJDOT Programs

Bike/Pedestrian Planning Assistance

- Since 1996, plans in 75+ towns
- On-call consultants
- Types of projects:

bicycle and pedestrian circulation studies, pedestrian safety assessments, trail feasibility studies, bikeway plans, crosswalk improvement plans, etc.









Federal Aid Highway Program



Authorization of Federal Aid Funds

- Funds are provided on a reimbursement basis
- Costs incurred prior to authorization of funds are ineligible for reimbursement
- 80/20 match is covered by NJDOT

Local Lead Program

- MPO sub-regions eligible
- Competitive selection process
- Federal-aid routes and bridges eligible
- \$105M federal
- Provides funds to advance projects through preliminary engineering, final design, right of way, and construction





Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP)

- Established in 2012 under MAP 21
- Community-based
- Transportation projects (land & water)
 - Expands travel choice
 - Strengthens local economy
 - Improve quality of life
 - Protect the environment
- 7 Eligible Categories with a Transportation focus







Transportation Alternatives Program

- Includes what was
 - Transportation Enhancements
 - Recreational Trails
 - Safe Routes to School
- New Jersey maintains separate Safe Routes to School and Transportation Alternative programs
- Requires a competitive project selection process
- Recreational Trails Program is run by NJDEP

Transportation Alternatives

7 Eligible Categories

- Provision of facilities for bicycles and pedestrians
- Scenic or historic highway programs
- Landscaping and other scenic beautification
- Historic preservation
- Rehabilitation of historic transportation facilities
- Preservation of abandoned railway corridors (including conversion to pedestrian and bicycle trails)
- Environmental mitigation to address water pollution







Safe Routes to School

Program Goals


- Where it's safe, get kids walking and biking.
- Where it's not safe, make it safe.
- Encourage children, including those with disabilities, to walk & bicycle to school.

SRTS Grant

Funds infrastructure projects that enable children in grades K-8 to walk & bicycle to school

- Improve safety
- Reduce traffic & fuel consumption
- Reduce air pollution






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Safe Routes to Schoo

Safe Routes to School

- Within 2 miles of a K-8 school
- Support from school board AND municipality*
- Potential to improve safety
- Potential to increase students walking or biking to school
- Connects to existing bike or pedestrian networks
- Ongoing activities to promote walking and biking

* County, state, property owner, etc.
