Meeting Notes:

The discussion covered a wide range of subjects including infrastructure upgrades, bicycle, and pedestrian safety, MUTCD updates, and transportation planning.

• Speed Limits and Roadway Design:

- Interest in better understanding the 85th percentile, level of service, and statutory ways to reduce speed limits, especially in light of recent changes to the MUTCD.
- Consideration of land use's impact on roadway design.
- Concerns about liability and the use of delineators in creating bike facilities, along with issues related to maintenance, durability, drainage, and trash.
- Discussion on how advocates can use new MUTCD guidance with demonstration projects.
- Interest in presentations on road safety audits and retrofitting arterial roadways for complete streets.

• Trail Crossing Guidance:

- Inquiry into additional trail crossing guidance in New Jersey, and status of reports in development.
- There is interest in New Jersey trail crossing guidelines and plans to adapt major highways to accommodate whole streets.

• Conversation focused on Trenton and barriers the municipality has faced as they try to improve local trails.

- NJ Transit Initiatives:
 - Discussion on new bike station openings at NJ Transit stations.
 - Challenges faced in using CMAQ funding and federal funds for bicycle stations and how to streamline the process.
 - Addressing the lack of bus racks on some local buses.
- COVID-19 Impacts and Data Collection:
 - Analysis of the impact of work-from-home trends on biking and walking.
 - Concerns about the sustainability of changes made during COVID-19, like open streets.
 - Discussion on improving bike/pedestrian data collection beyond commuting data.

• Federal Funding and Local Aid:

- Concerns about tapping into new federal funding effectively in New Jersey.
- Discussion on assisting towns with applying for and implementing grants.
- Legal Issues and Ordinances:
 - Questions about advising on legal issues related to bicycles and pedestrians.
 - Interest in model ordinances for regulating e-bikes, especially in shore towns.
- Road Diets and Public Perception:
 - Discussion on the Atlantic City Road diet and public perception challenges.

Potential topics for discussion in 2024

- Updates and Best Practices on MUTCD and Roadway Design:
 - Further exploration of MUTCD updates, particularly regarding intersection treatments and innovative designs.
- Trail Crossing and Safety:
 - Seeking more guidance on trail crossing safety and implementation of best practices.
- Bike Lane and Facility Planning:
 - Exploring bike lanes and facilities that cross jurisdictional boundaries and planning for pedestrian phases at crosswalks.
- Micro Mobility and Safety:
 - Focusing on micro mobility policies and safety, including battery charging and fire safety.
- Speed Limit Reductions:
 - Investigate statutory alternatives for reducing speed limits and overcoming related challenges.
- Land Use and Transportation Planning:
 - Continue exploring how land use changes influence roadway design and transportation infrastructure.
- Delineator Liability and Maintenance:
 - Address ongoing issues related to delineators in separated bike lanes, including liability, maintenance, and snow removal.
- Regulations for E-bikes:
 - · Develop and disseminate model ordinances for regulating e-bikes, particularly in tourist-

heavy areas.

- Road Diet Projects:
 - Monitor and evaluate the Atlantic City Road diet project, emphasizing the importance of evidence-based road design decisions.

Subcommittee Goals for 2024:

Subcommittee members briefly discussed goals and topics for 2024 meetings by reviewing and editing the goals from 2023:

- 1. Enhance Understanding of Roadway Design and Safety Measures:
 - a. Deep dive into roadway design updates, speed limit policies, and the impact of land use on roadway configuration.
- 2. Improve Trail and Bike Facility Safety:
 - a. Gather and disseminate best practices for trail crossings and bike facility safety, addressing liability and maintenance issues.
- 3. Advocate for Improved Policies and Funding:
 - a. Work towards loosening federal funding restrictions for bike amenities and addressing local bus rack issues.
- 4. Legal and Regulatory Guidance:
 - a. Provide guidance on legal issues and model ordinances related to biking and walking, focusing on emerging trends like e-bikes.
- 5. Public Engagement and Perception:
 - a. Address public perception issues related to roadway changes, such as road diets, through community engagement and education.
- 6. Facilitate Speed Limit Changes:
 - a. Work towards statutory changes that allow for more flexible speed limit regulations to enhance road safety.
