

Biden-Harris Administration Announces Funding for 162 Community-Led Infrastructure Projects as Part of the Investing in America Agenda

U.S. Secretary of Transportation Pete Buttigieg will join Assistant Democratic Leader Jim Clyburn and others in South Carolina to announce that the Biden-Harris Administration has awarded more than \$2.2 billion from the RAISE discretionary grant program to 162 different infrastructure projects across the country. Funding includes **three projects in New Jersey.**

- 1. Gateway tunnel project gets \$25M to kick-start construction on NJ side
- 2. <u>Camden County gets \$19M toward building 34-mile trail starting at Ben Franklin Bridge</u>
- 3. Manville Receives \$48,000 Federal Grant to Improve Railroad Crossings



Medford Receives \$1.4M Grant To Make Improvements To Main Street

A \$1.4 million New Jersey Department of Transportation (NJDOT) Alternative Program (TAP) grant has been awarded to Medford Township to "make improvements to Main Street," Township Manager Kathy Burger announced during a June 7 Medford Township Council meeting. The grant funds, she said, are to be used for the "Main Street – North/South Bike and/or Pedestrian Connector" which passes through portions of Church Road, Wilkins Station Road, Route 70, and Main Street.

Union County to Convert Unused Rails to Trails With \$1.5M From NJDOT

The county's efforts to convert unused train lines into trails is taking shape in Roselle Park and Kenilworth with a project that connects to existing greenways and parks, branching into the Watchung Reservation.

The New Jersey Department of Transportation awarded \$1.5 million in funding this month to the Rahway Valley Rails-to-Trails project, which will create multi-use trails from the abandoned Rahway Valley Railroad section through Kenilworth and Roselle Park, as part of its Transportation Alternatives Set-Aside Program.

Mercer County receives \$175,000 grant to study Johnson Trolley Trail Corridor

Mercer County has received a \$175,000 grant for a feasibility study of the Johnson Trolley Trail Corridor to develop a pedestrian and bicycle route that would connect the Municipality of Princeton and the City of Trenton.

The \$175,000 grant was awarded to Mercer County by the Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission (DVRPC). It is being funded through the DVRPC's Community Development Initiative grant program.

The policy statement, "Child Pedestrian Safety," and an accompanying technical report, "Epidemiology and Prevention of Child Pedestrian Injury," will be published in the July 2023 Pediatrics (published online June 20).


